## 2011 FLORIDA FOLK HERITAGE AWARDS

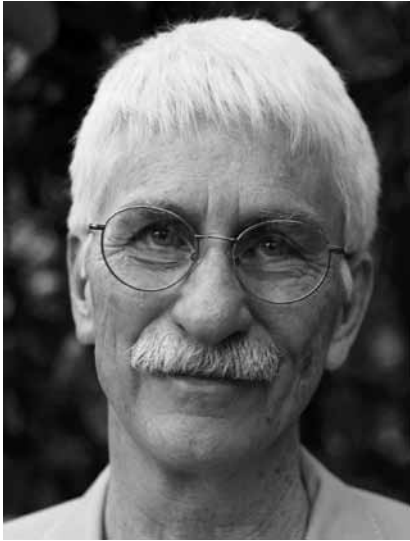
**George Soffos** is a widely recognized master of the bouzouki, a distinctive Greek guitar that is similar to the mandolin and belongs to the lute family. A valued member of the large Greek community in Tarpon Springs, Soffos upholds the proud heritage of the bouzouki player as custodian and guardian of traditional musical culture. The bouzouki is regarded as the preeminent instrument of traditional and contemporary performance, requiring a delicate touch, subtle ornamentation, and command of both the lyrical traditions of Grecian music and the urban traditions



of the bouzoukia, or Greek night clubs. Soffos has been a student of the bouzouki since he was 15 years old, when he was sent to study with John Tatsapoulos, a master of the instrument. Since that time, he has played in the bouzoukia of Washington D.C., New York, Chicago, Las Vegas, Los Angeles, Detroit, Miami, Nashville, and countless other cities, both in the U.S. and abroad. Since returning to Tarpon Springs in the late 1990s, Soffos has become one of the most sought-after performers at local festivals and nightspots. He is a mentor and supporter among the community of younger performers, and teaches through the City of Tarpon Springs Greek Arts Initiative, which encourages the preservation and practice of Greek community arts.

## 2011 FLORIDA FOLK HERITAGE AWARDS

**Bob Stone** has been a practicing folklorist since 1990. An engineer by training, he has worked with HistoryMiami, the Augusta Heritage Workshops, and the Florida Folklife



Program. Now a self-employed folklorist, Stone began documenting Florida's traditional culture as a member of the Bureau of Florida Folklife in White Springs. Specializing in documentary photography and media production, he has contributed to numerous projects that have enhanced our understanding of the state's diverse folklife, including Florida Cattle

Ranching: Five Centuries of Tradition, On My Way to Heaven, and the Voices of Florida radio series. As a researcher skilled in documenting musical traditions, he has assisted with dozens of compilations from varied cultural communities, including multiple Sacred Steel Guitar albums and Music From the Sunshine State, as well as contributing segments to National Public Radio's All Things Considered. Additionally, he has penned essays for anthologies and other publications featuring notable Florida musicians and artists. In 2010, his extensive research on the sacred steel guitar tradition culminated in the publication of Sacred Steel: Inside an African American Steel Guitar Tradition. Stone has worked tirelessly for two decades as a passionate advocate and proponent of the folk arts in Florida, assisting numerous artists and musicians from all over the Sunshine State.

## SECRETARY OF STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION AWARDS 2011 SENATOR BOB WILLIAMS AWARD

**David Ferro's** contribution to the preservation of Florida's historic properties and sites began in 1978, when he started work at the Florida Department of State to document, research, and help plan the restoration of Florida's historic capitol to its 1902 appearance.



A registered architect since 1979, over the next 30 years, until his retirement in 2010, Ferro served as the supervisor of the Bureau of Historic Preservation's Architectural Preservation Services. In that role he oversaw the Florida Main Street Program, the Historic Preservation Tax Incentives Program, and later,

the legislatively funded, Historic Preservation Grants-in-Aid Program, which has supported over 3,000 projects, reaching every county in Florida. He provided stewardship and supervised the ongoing care and repairs to the Call-Collins family home, The Grove. He provided technical assistance to the staffs of Florida State Parks and the National Park Service in projects such as the Cape Florida Lighthouse and the stabilization of Fort Jefferson in the Dry Tortugas. With 1000 Friends of Florida, he contributed to the development of the projects and publications of Disaster Planning and Disaster Mitigation for Florida's Historic Structures.

His impact is statewide, but in Tallahassee, perhaps most strongly evidenced at Mission San Luis, with the historic reconstruction of the Castillo de San Luis, and the new Visitor and Education Center. From 1999 until his retirement, Ferro served as Deputy State Historic Preservation Officer for Architectural Preservation Services.

2011 MARY CALL DARBY COLLINS AWARD

**Dorothy Jenkins Fields, Ph. D.** has devoted her life to increasing the awareness of south Florida's African-American history to a national level. A Miami native, Dr. Fields is responsible for the establishment of The Black Archives, History & Research Foundation of South Florida, Inc., the designation and restoration of Overtown's landmark Lyric Theater and other historic sites, and the creation of the Miami-Dade Black Heritage Trail.



A teacher and educator for Miami-Dade County Public Schools for more than 30 years, Fields began her career in 1964 after graduating from Spelman College. She later earned a master's degree in curriculum and instruction at the University of Northern Colorado, and a Ph.D. in 20th-century African-American history, historic preservation, and public history from The Union Institute in Cincinnati, Ohio.

In 1974, in preparation for the nation's bicentennial, she began a search for curriculum materials on the black experience in South Florida. When she was unable to find any information about South Florida's black history in any school or public library, she embarked on a journey that would become her lifelong professional mission.

## 2011 GREAT FLORIDIAN AWARDS

### Thomas Alva Edison



The American inventor, scientist, and businessman, Thomas Edison, first came to Fort Myers, Florida in 1885 while searching for the perfect material for the light bulb filament. For the next 50 years, Edison and his wife Mina maintained their main residence in West Orange, New Jersey, and spent the winters and springs in Fort Myers. In the laboratory of his Fort Myers home, Edison experimented

with using plant and tree fibers as a filament for his electric lights. Edison's good friend Henry Ford followed close behind and purchased the neighboring property in 1915. Edison and Ford spent many winters working, talking and relaxing together in tropical southwest Florida. A decade after the inventor's death in 1931, Edison's widow willed their Florida home to the city. Today the Edison-Ford Winter Estates in Fort Myers, listed in the National Register of Historic Places, welcomes visitors to 20 acres of historical buildings, historic gardens, the Edison Botanic Research Lab and the Estates Museum. Restored buildings include the Edison Main House, Guest House, Caretaker's House and the Ford House. The 1929 historic landscape includes the award winning Moonlight Garden. The Estates Museum has hundreds of inventions, artifacts and special exhibits.

## 2011 GREAT FLORIDIAN AWARDS

### The Honorable Bob Graham



Daniel Robert “Bob” Graham was practically born into Florida politics on November 9, 1936, just a week after his father, Ernest “Cap” Graham was elected to the Florida Senate as an anti-corruption reformist. One of the most accomplished politicians in Florida history, Bob Graham never lost an election for office in more than four decades of public service at the local, state and national level. As a state legislator, two-term governor, and a three-term U.S. Senator,

Graham has had a role in nearly every major public policy issue in modern Florida.

After retiring from public service in early 2005, Graham spent the 2005-2006 academic year at Harvard University’s Kennedy School of Government. He is the author of *America: The Owner’s Manual*, a book that employs case studies of successful efforts by citizens to influence the political system. Graham also remains active in politics, serving on the Financial Crisis Inquiry Commission, and most recently, as co-chair of President Barack Obama’s BP Deepwater Horizon Oil Spill and Offshore Drilling Commission.

Having personally witnessed Florida’s rise from a predominantly rural state to an economic and political juggernaut that is now the nation’s fourth largest state, in 2008 he created the Bob Graham Center in Public Service at the University of Florida to train the next generation of Sunshine leaders.

## 2011 GREAT FLORIDIAN AWARDS

### George Washington Jenkins



George Jenkins, founder of Publix Super Markets, Inc., began with virtually nothing, yet by sheer determination, he succeeded in forging an organization unlike any before. During his 88 years, Jenkins' accomplishments were amazing - sometimes even to himself. In the midst of the Great Depression, he opened the first Publix store in Winter Haven, Florida. What began with one store would become the \$24.3

billion Fortune 100 company of today, with more than 1,000 stores, providing jobs to more than 140,000 people in Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, Alabama, and Tennessee.

From the beginning, Jenkins believed in profit sharing and employee ownership. Today, Publix is the largest employee-owned supermarket in the nation. To give the customer a better quality, more uniform product, Publix pioneered the prepackaging of vegetables and fruits. Publix strategies such as the deli department and bakery operations were innovative departures from the norm of early supermarketing.

In 1966, he established the George W. Jenkins Foundation, funding the foundation with his own personal Publix stock. Now under the leadership of Carol Jenkins Barnett, Mr. Jenkin's youngest daughter, the foundation, known today as Publix Super Markets Charities remains committed to serving the communities in which Publix operates. During his 59 years of leadership at Publix, Jenkins set the standard for customer service, employee relations, and community involvement.

## 2011 GREAT FLORIDIAN AWARDS

### **The Honorable Toni Jennings**



A native of Orlando, Toni Jennings began her professional career as a public school teacher at Killarney Elementary in Orange County. After two terms as a member of the Florida House of Representatives, Jennings was elected to the Florida Senate in 1980 to represent Central Florida and was re-elected subsequently, for 20 consecutive

years. During her sixth term in office (1996-2000), Jennings was chosen by her peers to serve as Florida's first, and only, two-term State Senate President. As Senate leader, she distinguished herself as a skilled consensus builder. She championed workforce development initiatives, created the state's school readiness program, and was instrumental in establishing a system of accountability in public education.

While dedicating more than 24 years to public service, she also successfully ran Jack Jennings & Sons, a family-owned construction business. After 20 years leading the company, she stepped down to serve as Gov. Jeb Bush's lieutenant governor from March 2003 until January 2007. As Lt. Governor, Jennings was a key figure in shaping the state's agenda for educational excellence and for affordable, accessible healthcare.

## 2011 GREAT FLORIDIAN AWARDS

### **Governor Harrison Reed**

In 1868, just five years after his arrival in Florida, Harrison Reed was elected as the state's first Republican governor and its first governor following the Civil War. During his tenure, he had the challenge of trying to reinstate the state's civil government and re-stablize the shattered financial and taxation system.



Despite the problems, Reed continued to work for positive change in Florida. He tried to enfranchise freed slaves and introduce social reforms in the face of much hostility. He supported and implemented a public school system within all areas of the state, created facilities for the infirm, and established a state university that addressed a broad array of education interests. Under his leadership, schools in Florida expanded dramatically, and the students progressed significantly. He appointed Jonathan Clarkson Gibbs as Florida's first African American Secretary of State in 1868.

Reed faced strong opposition during his term from Democrats and from a faction of Republicans who made two attempts to impeach him. After leaving office, he served as editor of the Jacksonville Semi-Tropical Monthly Magazine, and later as the Jacksonville postmaster. His final act of public service was to represent Duval County in Florida's House of Representatives in 1899 until his death on May 25, 1899, in Jacksonville.

## 2011 GREAT FLORIDIAN AWARDS

### **Nathaniel Pryor Reed**

Over the last half century, Nathaniel Reed has distinguished himself as an environmental advisor to seven Florida governors from both political parties, and as Assistant Secretary of the Interior under Presidents Richard Nixon and Gerald Ford. He



has been a lifelong crusader on behalf of the Everglades. Mr. Reed's public service career in Florida began in 1962, when he became involved in strengthening the policies regarding salvage and treasure leases in Florida's territorial waters. In 1967, Reed accepted Governor Claude Kirk's offer to serve as the state's first Governor's Environmental Counsel. Reed played a key role in opposing the Florida Jetport and the Cross Florida Barge Canal. Governor Bob Graham appointed Reed to serve on the South Florida Water Management District Governing Board, a position he held for 14 years, being subsequently reappointed by Governors Martinez and Chiles.

Reed chaired the committee that developed the mechanisms to create and fund Florida's ambitious state land acquisition programs which have protected more than 2.4 million acres of land. He co-chaired the committee which called for establishment of the Florida Greenways program, and served on ELMS II, which led to the creation of Florida's comprehensive plan and greater regional planning. To this day, his leadership continues to transform the environmental culture, values and public policies of Florida.

## 2011 GREAT FLORIDIAN AWARDS

### **Marshall E. “Doc” Rinker, Sr.**



Marshall Edison “Doc” Rinker, Sr. came to Palm Beach County in 1926 and started Rinker Rock & Sand Co. with a dump truck and a shovel. During the next four decades, Rinker expanded the business, which he renamed Rinker Materials Corporation, adding concrete block and cement production, and divisions for aggregate and real estate. By 1988, Rinker Materials was the largest producer of ready-mix concrete and block in Florida, and Rinker sold it to CSR Limited, an Australian company.

Rinker was a leader of many state and national organizations in his industry and his community, including the National Ready Mixed Concrete Association, American Red Cross, YMCA, and Rotary International. During World War II, Rinker was a member of the Civil Air Patrol, which flew private planes out of West Palm Beach and Lantana in search of German submarines along the Florida coast.

Since its inception in 1968, Rinker supported Palm Beach Atlantic College, which awarded him an honorary doctorate and a Free Enterprise Award, and named its business school for him. The Kravis Center’s Rinker Playhouse was also named in his honor, as well as buildings at Stetson University and the University of Florida. The Palm Beach Post named Rinker the John D. MacArthur Business Leader of the Year in 1986. Rinker endowed the Marshall E. Rinker Sr. Foundation and the Marshall and Vera Lea Rinker Foundation to continue his giving to these and other institutions.

## 2011 GREAT FLORIDIAN AWARDS

### **The Honorable Jim Smith**

Recognized for his remarkable leadership skills, Jim Smith has served the state of Florida in various roles since 1968.

From 1979 to 1987, he served the state as Florida's Attorney General, and from 1987 to 1995, and again in 2002 to 2003, as Florida Secretary of State.

Smith served as the co-chair for the Florida Election Reform Task Force, on the Board of Regents for the State University System, and as Chairman of the Florida State University Board

of Trustees. At the national level he worked extensively with Vice President Bush's Drug Policy Task Force, as a member of the National Park System Advisory Board, and is currently serving on the Deepwater Horizon Oil Spill Legal Advisory Council as a pro bono legal advisor.



Smith has been recognized by many organizations for his work in the area of environmental and education issues, and the practice of law.

Currently working as counsel for Panza, Maurer & Maynard, LLP, and a shareholder for Smith & Ballard, his leadership, whether in government or the private sector, has been marked by his genuine concern for people and the citizens of Florida.

## 2011 GREAT FLORIDIAN AWARDS

### The Honorable Park Trammell



Park Trammell's life and career embodied the growth and coming of age of Florida.

He attended elementary school in Polk County and worked on the family farm and in a newspaper office. During the Spanish-American War, he was in the quartermaster service at Tampa. Trammell practiced law in Lakeland, where he also was

a citrus grower and a newspaper owner and editor. In 1903, he was elected to the Florida House of Representatives, and was president of the 1905 Florida Senate. Trammell was elected attorney general in 1908 and governor in 1912. As governor, he successfully urged the passage of a law to control spending during election campaigns. He helped to establish a state tax commission to equalize property assessments among Florida's counties, and championed the development of a statewide highway system by creating the State Road Department in 1915. He was elected to the U.S. Senate in 1916 and served as Florida's junior senator until his death in Washington, D.C., in 1936. In 1929, Florida Senators Trammell and Duncan U. Fletcher supported pioneering legislation for the establishment of the Everglades National Park. Senator Trammell is also remembered for the Vinson-Trammell Act of 1934 which laid the foundation for the modern US Navy, and for securing numerous naval installations for Florida that led to the development of Florida's Intracoastal Waterway.

#### **Jan Godown Annino**

*She Sang Promise: The Story of Betty Mae Jumper, Seminole Tribal Leader*

Jan Godown Annino left rural New Jersey for Florida “at an age when a new pal with a retired circus clown Dad, and when colored floodlights flashing on white gravel yards at night, made a big impression.” Jan calls “the state scalloped by barrier islands” her literary home. She is a proud graduate of Sarasota County public schools and the University of Florida. Jan trailed two generations of her family into newspaper work. Later she focused more on books and on her photography. She and her family live in Tallahassee.

#### **Carol Frost**

*Honeycomb*

Carol Frost is the author of nine collections of poems. She has received National Endowment for the Arts fellowships, PEN and Pushcart awards, the Elliston and the Poets' Prize, and other honors. She holds the Alford Chair of English at Rollins College.

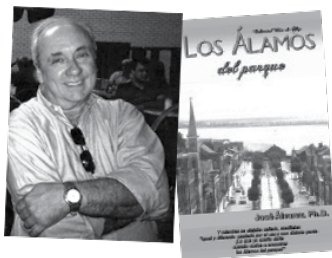


### SPANISH LANGUAGE

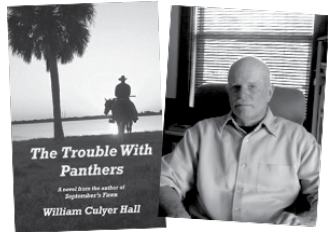
## 2011 FLORIDA BOOK AWARDS

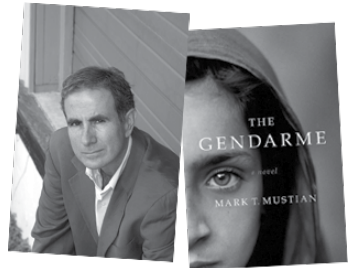

Another continuing focus is the Springs of North Florida, whose paradisiacal presence provides a sense of ideal destination and the exotic in the here- and-now that counterpoints the sense of passage, time and journey implicit in the Door paintings.



## 2011 FLORIDA BOOK AWARDS

### LIFETIME LITERARY ACHIEVEMENT

#### **Carl Hiaasen**



This year's Florida Lifetime Achievement for Writing award winner, Carl Hiaasen, was born and raised and still lives in the state of Florida. A graduate of the University of Florida, at age 23 he joined The Miami Herald as a general assignment reporter and went on to work for the paper's weekly magazine and later its prize-winning investigations team. Since 1985 Hiaasen has been writing a regular column where he shines the light on the unique characters and political climate of our beloved Sunshine State. For his journalism and commentary, Hiaasen has received

numerous state and national honors, including the Ernie Pyle Lifetime Achievement Award from the National Society of Newspaper Columnists for writing with "wit, style and an abiding sense of justice."

Hiaasen has produced a dozen novels, including the best-selling *Tourist Season*, *Double Whammy*, *Native Tongue*, *Stormy Weather*, *Lucky You*, *Nature Girl* and, most recently, *Star Island*. He has published three books for young readers, including *Scat*, *Flush*, and the Newbery Honor award-winning *Hoot*. The *London Observer* called him "America's finest satirical novelist...the blazing conscience of the Sunshine State." When the University of Florida Press nominated Carl Hiaasen for this award they noted that "If bestselling author Carl Hiaasen had never been born, we might have had to invent him."

Hiaasen is also the author of two works of nonfiction, and two collections of his Miami Herald columns—which he still writes on a weekly basis, trying to keep Florida a paradise.

## 2011 FLORIDA ARTISTS HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE

### James F. Hutchinson



“James F. Hutchinson is an artist whose work evokes the native soul of Florida,” said Secretary of State Kurt S. Browning. “His long years of bringing Florida’s natural and historical landscapes to his easel, has forever placed these images in a context where our descendents will be able to appreciate the many wonders of our state.”

A cultural landscape and historical narrative painter born in 1932 and raised in Stuart, James F. Hutchinson’s award-winning images of Florida’s back country and native wildlife are held by national collectors, museums, libraries, and universities. One of the state’s finest master artists, he is particularly renowned for his early documentation of Seminole and Miccosukee Indian culture funded by the Arthur Vining Davis Foundation. Mr. Hutchinson’s years living among them in the 1960s produced the first paintings of tribal elders and their families at a time when Florida’s natives had not yet fully engaged mainstream society. This historically-accurate work is now in the permanent collections of HistoryMIAMI and the Elliott Museum in Stuart. Commemorative prints of these were published in Florida’s Official Bicentennial Book, and given to international heads of state. His artwork has contributed to six Florida books and countless publications. Mr. Hutchinson’s later paintings and sculpture have been collected internationally, and he continues to receive commissions to depict the natural wonders of this state and of the State of Hawaii, where he also has an art studio.

## 2011 FLORIDA ARTISTS HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE

### Johnny Tillotson



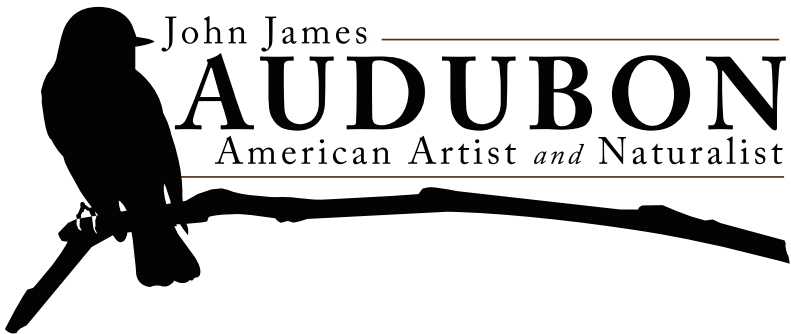
“Johnny Tillotson’s career spans decades of writing and recording hit songs of American Popular Music that provide a well-remembered soundtrack to the lives of many Floridians,” said Secretary of State Kurt S. Browning. “His lifetime commitment as a sponsor and performer at benefit concerts and charity events has helped an untold number of people in this state and this country.”

Johnny Tillotson was born in Jacksonville in 1938 and grew up in Palatka. An internationally-known entertainer and recording artist, he represents the bedrock of early pop music and had many charted hits. His hit songs have been recorded by more than 100 popular artists, including: Elvis Presley, Dean Martin, Bobby Darin, Billy Joe Royal, Hank Locklin, and others. In his long career as a recording artist, he received many entertainment industry achievement awards. Mr. Tillotson’s career has taken him to worldwide fame. He released a long list of albums and sold millions of records worldwide. His standing on the Billboard Pop Charts of the Fifties and Sixties is legend. An early star of the American Bandstand show, his music has often been used in film and television, and he performed with all the major artists. He wrote and/or recorded many of that era’s top hits, and was one of the very first crossover artists of the Pop/Country field—also appearing on the Grand Ol’ Opry with the most popular Country Music artists. Mr. Tillotson still tours internationally and appears in many charity benefit concerts and telethons throughout this country. He is the recipient of the 2006 Alumni of Distinction Award from the University of Florida, his alma mater.

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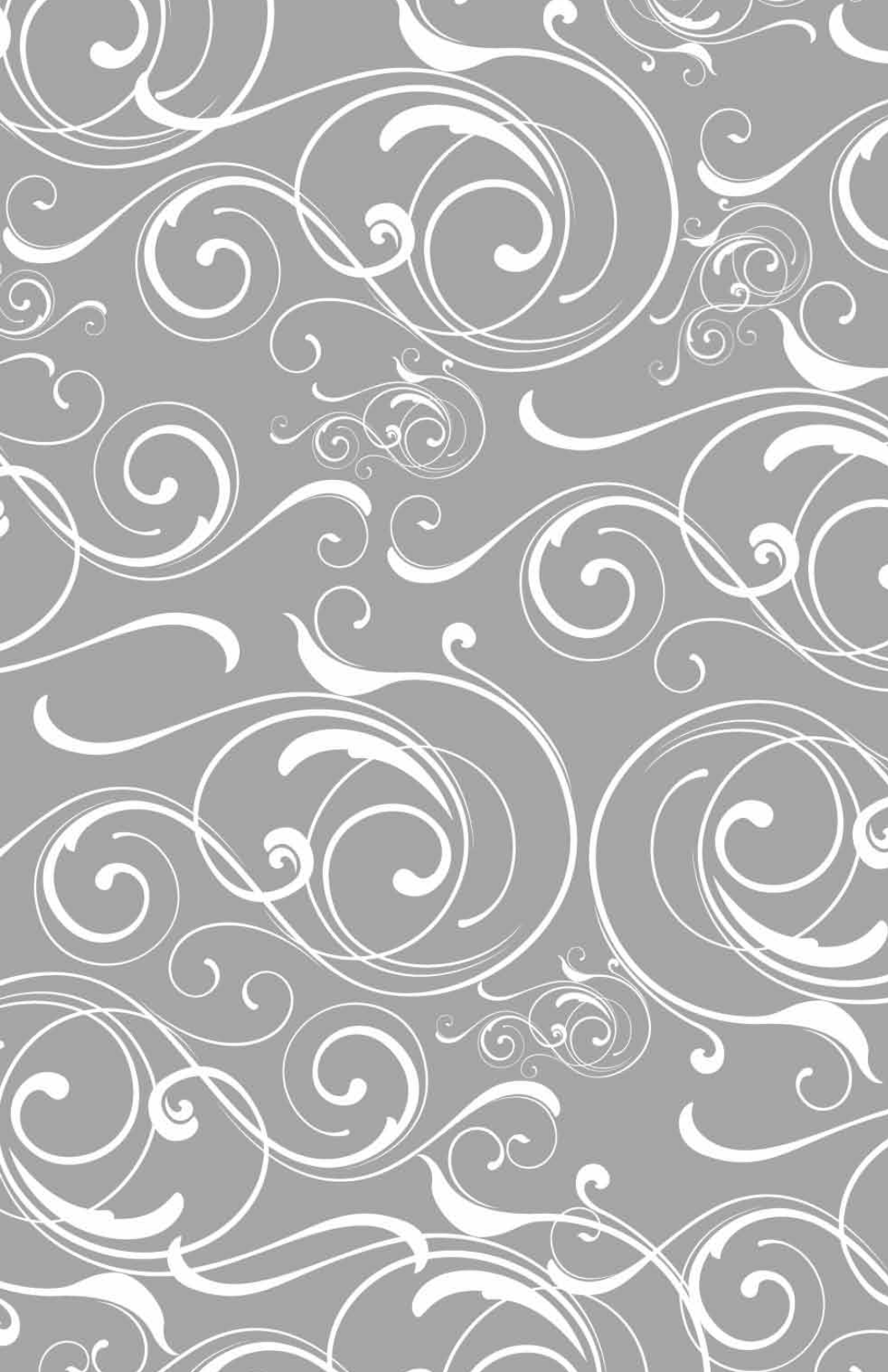
